Sarnia, the Imperial City and largest community on Lake Huron, has a long and distinguished history. First Nations lived, hunted and traveled there for over 10,000 years. In 796 AD an amalgamation of Ojibwa, Ottawa, and Potowatami clans formed the Three Fires Confederacy and controlled this, the very hub of the Great Lakes, trading with Huron, Sioux and Iroquois nations, as well as Great Britain and France.

It was Sarnia's remarkable natural harbour that first attracted the French explorer La Salle who named the site "The Rapids" when he had horses and men pull his 45-tonne barque up the swift current of the St. Clair River in 1679. Two hundred and fifty years later Sir John Colborne, former Governor of Guernsey in the Channel Islands, was appointed Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada. When he visited The Rapids in 1835 he proposed the name "Port Sarnia"- Latin for Guernsey. The name was accepted. By May 7th 1914, the village had grown sufficiently to be called what it is today -the City of Sarnia.

Sarnia is justifiably proud of its illustrious history. Nearby Oil Springs was the first North American location to drill commercially for oil. Revolutionary techniques acquired there would be used globally. Opened in 1891, The St Clair tunnel connecting Sarnia, Ontario to Port Huron, Michigan was the first railway tunnel ever constructed under a river. In 1871, Imperial Oil built a refinery in Sarnia. Expanded during World War Two, it would become the largest in the British Commonwealth. At the same time, Polymer Corporation established a plant to manufacture synthetic rubber; a huge success, it sparked Sarnia's rise to become the world class petrochemical centre it is today.

The waterway between Detroit and Sarnia is one of the world's most active; the city's grain elevator is the sixth largest in Canada. The Blue Water Bridge is the second busiest crossing between the United States and Canada. Western University's Bowman Centre for Technology Commercialization, focusing on industrial biotechnology, is Canada's largest clean-tech incubator. Sarnia is also home to one of the largest photo voltaic plants in the world.
